Psychology Advising Overview

- The Psychology undergraduate department recently transitioned from faculty advisors to professional advisors.
- Advisor Caseloads between 360~ students each.
- Major: 900-950 students overall with many PSYC Minors.
- Professional advisors are responsible for multiple administrative duties, in addition to advising.

Changes in Student Populations

- Compared to the class of 2024, the Virginia Tech class of 2025:
 - 75% more African American students
 - 43% more Hispanic and Latinx students
 - 47% increase of First-generation students
- President Sands stated we are close to reaching the goal of having 40% of an entering class consist of low-income, first-generation, veteran, and underrepresented students by 2022 (Zapata, 2021).

Leveling the Playing Field

- First-generation students lack the cultural capital of the university system that they enter, including awareness of the existence of a university system culture or the language that they are expected to know (Jenkins et al., 2013).
- In many ways, advisors and instructors are meant to level the playing field, giving students equal access to the same resources (Platt et al., 2021).

Proactive Advising & Intrusive Communication

- Proactive academic advising is one approach that may foster students' sense of engagement with their institution and help them navigate obstacles on their path to academic success (Varney, 2013).
- The nature of intrusive communication plays a key role in soliciting student involvement in on- and off-campus opportunities (Finnie et al., 2017).

Motivation for Student Communication Plan

- Efficiently share information with our large advising caseloads.
 - A solution to a deficit of time to devote per student.
- Promote student success, retention, and engagement for all students.
- Create a more equal playing field for "assumed" collegiate knowledge for first-generation, first-year, and transfer students.
- Increase student involvement in on- and off-campus opportunities.

Successful Starts Tip

Review Syllabi & Find Classrooms

We are so excited for you to begin your first semester as a Hokie! Here are some tips to help you start your classes next week confidentally. Preparation ahead of time is key!

Walk your Schedule Before

A few days before classes begin, it can really help to walk around campus and find where all of your class building and rooms are. You can use Google Maps on your phone or use this VT Interactive Map here.

Check VT Email and VT Canvas Daily

Make sure to keep a close eye on your vt.edu email for updates from professors. All of your courses and the syllabi should be found on the VT Canvas website here.



Review your Class Syllabi

It really helps to go into the first day of classes with an understanding of course content and how you will be graded.
We've highlighted some aspects for you to look for in you syllabi below.

Look for these Syllabus Items

- Attendance Policy
- Does class attendance have an impact on your overall grade? How many days can you miss? Do you need to email the professor beforehand if you need to miss class for being sick?
- Late Assignment Policy
 - Can you submit late work? How many points off do you receive if so?
- Grading Scale
 - Is your overall class grade from mainly exams or assignments? How much does your final exam factor into this?
- Communication Guidelines
- What is the best way to contact your professor? Email or phone?
- <u>Professor Office Hours</u>
 - Does your professor offer in-person and/or virtual office hours? What days and times is your professor available to meet with you to offer help? Do you need to schedule a meeting?



Successful Starts Tip

Organization

Transitioning to college can be an overwhelming experience. Here are some organizational tips to make it less overwhelming!

Keep a Planner or Electronic Calendar

- Schedule your Class Times
- Schedule all of your due dates (assignments, quizzes, exams, etc.)
- If you are working, schedule in your work schedule.
- Then schedule time to prepare for classes, complete assignments, and study.
- Make sure to schedule some time and give yourself a break:
 - Make time for YOUR self care, whatever that looks like! See your friends, visit counseling, go to the gym, watch a show, etc.!



Form a Daily To-Do List Habit:

- Each day or the night before, look at your calendar or planner and create a to-do list for the day!
- This will help you stay on task and resist distractions.

Keep you work space decluttered:

- Our work space can often reflect how we feel in the moment.
- Take a few moments each day to clean up and organize your work space. It will be less distracting when you are completing your to-do list!

Keep your Courses Separate:

- We acknowledge that it's tempting (and cheaper) to keep all of your notes in one notebook.
- However, at the end of the day, it can become very confusing what notes belonged to what course.
- We recommend keeping separate notebooks, folders, binders (whatever you preference) for each course.

Successful Starts Tip

Study Skills

It's time to start building effective study habits for yourself. Consistently studying throughout the semester is the most effective way to learn the course material and do well on future exams.

Tips for Studying Effectively:

- Go back and read/review the notes that you took from your classes each day before bed or when you have free time sitting on the bus or waiting for class.
- Don't wait to study until the few days before the exam – begin at least a week before an exam dedicating time on this.
- Find your ideal study spot with no distractions (put your phone away) .
- Reward yourself with short study breaks by taking a walk or eating a snack.
- Utilize different techniques to study for different subjects (math do practice problems, History make flashcards).
- Go to professor office hours early if you have questions about the material.
- Get plenty of sleep before your exam. avoid procrastinating and all-nighters.

- On campus: Torgerson Bridge (very quiet), Newman Library, Squires Student Center, McBryde Hall, etc.
- Your room or somewhere quiet turn your phone off or silence it.
- Consider studying alone and/or with a group - find study spaces and reserve rooms for groups here.

- Work on deadlines early so you have plenty of time to ask questions.



Successful Starts Tip

Note Taking & Overall Tips

You've been in classes for a few weeks so it's time to check in on your note taking skills. Here are some overall tips regarding your professor's office hours, how to utilize the SSD office, and how to avoid procrastination.

Note Taking Tips:

- Preview your text prior to the lecture and read over past notes.
- Don't write down every word try to record main ideas and things your professor repeats as noteworthy.
- Write notes in bullets and phrases, use symbols and abbreviations.
- Record questions and thoughts that are confusing so you can follow up with your professor at office hours.
- Try using <u>Cornell Notes</u>, an outline, flowcharts, or concept maps.
- Check out the SSC workshop on Reading and Note-Taking for Comprehension and Retention <u>here</u>.



Go to Office Hours:

- Please check out your syllabi and Canvas course websites to see how your professor offers office hours.
- Office hours are great for asking questions related to class content and asking for study strategies.
- You can also build a relationship with your professor and learn more about their career research.

SSD Office & Accommodations:

- Request accommodations early in the semester – these include extended time on assignments and exams, note-taking assistance, and reduced-distraction testing spacing.
- To receive disability services accommodations, please complete the list of items found here.

Avoiding Procrastination:

- Break big assignments into smaller pieces to be completed over time.
- Eliminate distractions when it's time to get work done – no phones.
- Finish the hard stuff first.
- Find an accountability partner.

- You can go on any study abroad program (not just Psychology specific) but make sure to check in with your academic advisor beforehand to plan your next few semesters accordingly.


One Day Reserved for Admin Duties
